Future For Nature aims to protect threatened animal and plant species. Therefore, we support young, talented and ambitious conservationists. Young people with vision and purpose, who think and act out of the box. Trailblazers who inspire, galvanise and mobilise communities, governments and the public at large, to safeguard species and ecosystems. It's those individuals that bring hope for nature and our future.

As Sir David Attenborough put it when he was the Guest of Honour at the FFN Award event in 2009: "You can form all the committees, all the working groups, all the charities you like, but you know that in the end, it is that one individual, that one individual that has fire in the belly, that one individual that is determined that something should be done!"

ACTION

Every year our selection committees of top international conservationists select three of these young heroes. We give Future For Nature Award winners our unconditional trust and support, showcase their work and award them with \in 50,000 each. Once they are part of the growing family of Future For Nature winners, we continue supporting them to boost their impact on the environment and species. FFN facilitates alliances and meetings, continues to put the winners' work in the spotlight and matches individual winners with interested donors.

The first awards were handed out 16 years ago, back in 2008, in Royal Burgers' Zoo, Arnhem. This event was the start of an amazing yearly inspiring experience, which hosted many impressive Guests of Honour, such as Sir David Attenborough, Dame Jane Goodall and his majesty the King of the Netherlands. The FFN Awards concept, with its rigorous selection process by two selection committees followed by a renowned awards ceremony, has proven to be a successful formula for attracting young committed and inspiring wildlife heroes and motivating the wider audience for our cause.

CONTINUED SUPPORT FOR THE FFN FAMILY OF LAUREATES

As the foundation continues to grow in prominence and capacity, we hope to reach, inspire and support more people and play our part to protect the planet. The Future For Nature Foundation is dedicated to bringing together talented and driven young nature conservationists and supporting their work. We also strive to support the Family of winners through our FFN Family Funding scheme. Multiple Family members received funding in 2023 to undertake collaborative projects, or project visits to learn from each other's methods and approaches.

In the final phase, the FFN International Selection Committee reviewed the nominees. Each committee member scored the candidates and gave a qualitative evaluation. Based on these scores, the FFN Board decided on the three winners of the 2023 Future For Nature Awards: Pieter Van Wyk, Tomás Rivas Fuenzalida and Alona Prylutska.

Pieter van Wyk, South Africa


Pieter is a South African botanist committed to conserving the unique flora of the Richtersveld region in South Africa. Pieter is not holding back when it comes to environmental crimes and armed with knowledge and dedication, he works to preserve precious succulent species. Pieter managed to save over 100,000 poached succulents and many other plants from mining.

Tomás Rivas Fuenzalida, Brazil

Tomás is a Chilean conservationist dedic protect South America's rare raptors. He down bird nests to study their population local people on novel agroecological tech minimise human-raptor conflict. Alona Prylutska, Ukraine

Alona Prylutska is a Ukrainian conservationist dedicated to the rehabilitation of microbats in an urban environment. She rescues bats trapped in buildings, helps bust bat-myths and works towards creating safe-spaces for bats in the cities. Despite the dire circumstances in Ukraine, Alona and her team have persevered and continued their important bat conservation work. They have rescued many migrating bats from abandoned buildings and organise outreach activities.









FFN AWARD EVENT 2023

The 16th edition of the FFN Award Event celebrated not only the 3 winners, but also took us on a virtual journey visiting laureates across the world to highlight their achievements and share their challenges. This year's ceremony took the audience on a journey across the world, travelling past FFN Award laureates to highlight their recent achievements and share their challenges. We visited Colombia where José Gonzalez-Maya presented his jaguar-friendly ecolabel. We met wild southern right whales along the coast of Chile with Barbara Galletti. We listened to mesmerizing forest sounds of the Leuser ecosystem in Indonesia with Rudi Putra, and even crawled through caves looking for new bat roosts with Iroro Tanshi. FFN FAMILY: A GLOBAL NETWORK OF CONSERVATION EXCELLENCE

The Future For Nature Family of winners is now 48 conservationists strong and they are active in 31 countries, all over the world. Throughout the year we follow their achievements and challenges and help promote their work. In 2023, FFN spent more on Family support than ever before through our FFN Family Funding scheme (from 66,000 euro in 2022 to 117,089 euro in 2023) and laureates met each other whenever the opportunity arose. FFN FAMILY UPDATES

To increase the support from the Future For Nature Foundation to the growing family of winners, all previous FFN Award winners are eligible to apply for FFN Family funding, aimed at strengthening the collaboration within the Family through supporting visits and projects.

Aims of Future For Nature's Family Funding

- To encourage FFN Award winners to learn from each other. For example by visiting each other's projects in order to exchange knowledge and experience.
- To encourage collaborations between FFN Award winners, to set up new projects together.

New Organisations Were Established

Karen Allen (2015 winner) was "overwhelmingly inspired by her fellow FFN laureates" at the FFN Family Gathering in 2022 and went home to set up Foundation Likhulu. This young ambitious organisation focuses on improving marine conservation effectiveness in Mozambique by training the next generation of conservationists. Likhulu's list of active projects has grown exponentially throughout 2023 and the current focus is on launching the Marine Conservation Leadership Programme (MCLP). We follow the developments with excitement and support!

Hana Raza (2017 winner) has also established her own organisation, Leopards Beyond Borders, to continue her conservation work for the Persian leopard and other threatened wildlife in Kurdistan and Iraq. Leopards, vital ecosystem engineers, face a critical threat from habitat loss, poaching, and human encroachment. Hana's organisation collaborates with communities, governments, and partners to implement targeted initiatives that directly impact the preservation of habitats and the protection of wildlife, from reforestation projects to anti-poaching measures.

What do giant armadillos in Brazil and blue-throated macaws in Bolivia have in common?


Tjalle Boorsma, who protects blue-throated macaws, and Gabriel Massocato, a giant armadillo conservationist, went on an exchange to see how they can learn from, collaborate with, and help each other. The main aspect that connects these two species is that both live in the tropical savannas of South America where fire is a recurring threat. QWildlife App enables citizens to help protect koalas in Queensland, Australia

In 2023, Maggie Muurmans started her new job as Senior Conservation Officer at Queensland Environment to protect the koala across Australia. With the award-winning app QWildlife, she encourages people to become 'citizen' scientists' by taking pictures of koalas and reporting sightings. Koalas are threatened by forest fires and disease among other things, and reporting sightings helps to monitor and research their population.

In 2023, FFN continued to run the monthly FFN Family coaching sessions by FFN laureate Jean Thomas. Jean is a conservationist with 25 years of experience under her belt and a certified coach specialising in the conservation sector. Each session covers a different topic, and 2023 topics included "Passion, Purpose, and Prosperity": how passion can manifest, how purpose can be rediscovered, and how we can improve our relationship with money in the NGO world. Laureates are highly appreciative of the support FFN offers for developing the skills and capacity needed to deal with the most difficult conservation and environmental issues and we will keep this monthly complimentary mini-course on offer.

THE NEXT GENERATION

The Future For Nature Academy is a growing and evolving network of students and young graduates with a passion for nature conservation. Inspired by the accomplishments of FFN winners and other conservation heroes, they come together to organize a variety of events such as lectures, workshops, and excursions about all facets of nature conservation. This creates a powerful platform for young people to meet, discuss, and make plans together for a brighter future for nature.

In 2023, the FFN Academy saw notable growth and development. Thanks to the funding by the Otterfund, the role of FFN Academy coordinator was able to expand. The Academy is working hard to engage more educators by creating a network of involved teachers, which will create stability within the city teams and extend the reach of the FFN Academy. Despite some city teams still dealing with after effects of the pandemic, the FFN Academy has organized a total of 19 events this year! One of which was the first ever FFN Academy Alumni day, which was a great success with over 30 participants and inspiring talks by several alumni. Other events included a workshop about dealing with climate anxiety, a discussion evening about offshore windfarms, a hike in the Utrechtse Heuvelrug, and a lecture by FFN winner Tjalle Boorsma!

FFN ACADEMY DAY 2023

The 6th edition of the Future For Nature Academy Day was great! For the first time, the event was held in Utrecht, and more than 120 young and aspiring conservationists joined. The day started with the introduction of the FFN Award winners and time for students to ask them all their questions. After this plenary opening, there were many different sessions to join such as a debate about bat conservation, a workshop on reptile conservation, a lecture on falconry techniques, a creative theater show, and even tours through the botanical gardens!





75 people are supporting us as FFN Friends, pledging a total of €4.535 in 2023. Many of the FFN Friends have been donating to our foundation for more than three years.








